




PATION ATION




School Celebrations & National Anniversaries

2ND SEPTEMBER 2016

The academic year began formally with the Blessing Ceremony, conducted by the Metropolitan Bishop of Constantia and Ammochostos, Mr. Vasilios. The opening address was given by the Director of Xenion High School, Mrs Katelitsa Zouvani Phylactou. The bishop also gave a homily to the assembled students and staff.







CYPRUS INDEPENDENCE DAY - OCTOBER 1ST

A presentation by the school's Greek department, remembering in words and music this important anniversary, which commemorates the date in 1960 when Cyprus officially became an independent country.







28TH OCTOBER 1940 - OXI DAY

The anniversary of the occasion upon which Metaxas, the ailing Greek Prime Minister, refused to give in to the Axis powers and chose, instead, to join the fight against fascism.

Each October our students take part in the commemorative parade through Paralimni. On that occasion, the school banner and the national flags of Greece and Cyprus are carried proudly by year 7 students who have earned that privilege by their academic excellence. They are attended by an Honour Guard drawn from the best students in years 2 to 6. This year's commemorative presentation and ceremony was co-ordinated by Ms Margarita Prountzou.









15TH AND 17TH NOVEMBER - CONDEMNATION OF THE PSEUDOSTATE AND ANNIVERSARY OF THE POLYTECHNIC UPRISING

A number of different events took place; including the Student Council's delivery to UN representatives of a letter of protest at the continuing occupation of Cyprus by Turkish forces, a performance related to the Condemnation by Upper School students and a special presentation in the amphitheatre in commemoration of the student uprising of 1973 at Athens Polytechnic.





30TH JANUARY - DAY OF THE THREE HEIRARCHS

16TH FEBRUARY - TSIKNOPEMPTI

25TH MARCH AND 1ST APRIL -GREEK INDEPENDENCE DAY AND EOKA DAY

A joint celebration of these two important national holidays was marked by a beautifully performed production in the amphitheatre.

Greek Independence Day is celebrated on March 25 in commemoration of the start of the War of Greek Independence in 1821. It coincides with the Greek Orthodox Church's celebration of the Annunciation to the Virgin, when the Archangel Gabriel appeared to Mary and told her that she would bear the son of God. The anniversary is traditionally marked by a schools parade, in which schools carry their own flags together with the Cypriot and Greek flags.

Events on the 1st of April remember the beginning, in 1955, of the fight for independence from British rule in which the EOKA organisation played a leading role. In the parade on the 25th, our standard bearers led their fellow students in a dignified and proud representation of our school — as always.

Our Drama Club participated in the festival with a performance of their 2016 production, 'The Dragons and us'








PROTARAS FLOWER FESTIVAL

A large group of students from both the Junior School and the High School took part in the parade this year. The theme was 'Blooms of Hope' and aimed to raise awareness of cancer issues.















Theatrical Performance

'PEACE' BY ARISTOPHANES

In this biting satire on the warmongers of Athens and Sparta, Trygaeus, the protagonist, is on a mission to reason with the gods about the Peloponnesian War and, if necessary, to prosecute them for treason against Greece.

Arriving at Olympus, Trygaeus discovers that only Hermes is home; the other gods having packed up and departed for some remote refuge where they hope never to be troubled again by the war or by the prayers of humankind. Hermes alone is there, making some final arrangements for the new occupant of the house, War, who has already moved in. Peace, we are told, is imprisoned in a cave nearby.









War arrives, carrying a gigantic mortar in which he intends to continue grinding the Greeks to paste, but he complains that he no longer has a pestle to use with his mortar, as his old pestles, Cleon and Brasidas (the leaders of the pro-war factions in Athens and Sparta respectively) are both dead, recently perished in battle.

While War goes to find a new pestle, Trygaeus calls on Greeks everywhere to come and help him set Peace free while there is still time. They get to work pulling boulders from the cave's mouth and eventually the beautiful Peace and her comely companions, Festival and Harvest, emerge. Hermes explains that she would have been freed much earlier, except the Athenian assembly kept voting against it.

Trygaeus apologizes to Peace on behalf of his countrymen and leaves her to enjoy her freedom while he sets off again for Athens, taking Harvest and Festival back with him (Harvest to be his wife). Back in Athens, not everyone is happy with the new peace; after all, war is good for business! The makers of helmet crests and shields are angry until Trygaeus offers them suggestions as to how they can adapt their products to times of peace. In the end, all is well and the bad old days of war are looked back on with horror.



Xenion High School has always encouraged students to be active on the international stage, as befits young people who wish to take their place in the wider world. As a result, our school, our town and our country are well represented in many international settings by Xenion students – both in teams of delegates and as individuals.

The value of the life-skills; such as problem-solving, negotiating and planning; that are learned from such experiences cannot be overestimated and the understanding, tolerance and insight that students gain from international experiences are vital qualities in those who will lead our country in the future.

Political bodies such as the European Youth Parliament foster an understanding of the relationship between state and citizenry and an appreciation of the complexities of government. Through numerous initiatives, students work with their oversees peers in the building and promotion of friendship and co-operation and the mitigation of prejudice and insularity.

This understanding underlies the school's long-standing and enthusiastic commitment to raising both funds and awareness for a wide



range of good causes. Our school has, indeed, been so successful in charitable fundraising that we have been presented with a certificate by the Pancyprian Volunteerism Coordinative Council in recognition of our outstanding charity work throughout the year.

THE CHRISTODOULA MARCH

This event is held each year in memory of a remarkable woman from Famagusta. Becoming homeless after the invasion, Christodoula walked the road as a refugee despite suffering from terminal cancer. She reached Sotira, in much physical and mental pain, where she eventually died alone without any medical assistance or nursing care.



The aim of the Christodoula March is to raise public awareness of issues surrounding cancer and to raise the funds needed to continue financing the various services offered to cancer patients by the Cyprus Anticancer Society. This year, our Raising and Giving Club raised 688 euros for the cause.

The Raising and Giving Club is actively involved in a wide variety of charitable activities throughout the year. As well as the money they raised for the Christodoula March, the Club made another 100 euros by selling hand-made jewellery. Meanwhile the Art Club held successful bazaars at Christmas and at Easter, selling hand-made gifts and treats, raising 326 euros.









The Art Club also put together Christmas Gift Bags for children who might otherwise not have had presents to look forward to. These were given to the Diocese for distribution to families in need.







DONATIONS TO FAMILIES

1000 euros was raised and divided equally among five families in need.

A total of **600 euros** was donated to a mother whose son lost his eye. The Student Council gifted 510 euros and the remaining 90 euros was donated by 1A from their class funds.

He was ranked overall 5th in Cyprus.




Science & Technology Competitions

MERA - 2016

Our school participated in this year's competition with 8 students from years 5 and 6. Their research was into the socioeconomic consequences of Cyprus' 'Bail-out' in 2013.


The project focused on whether the bank bail-out scheme had had a significant effect on people living in the Famagusta area, and in particular on factors such as:





- 1. Education: Whether parents are interested in private education.
- 2. Tourism: If the quality and quantity of our tourist product has changed
- 3. Society: If the residents of the Famagusta area have shown any significant changes in their behaviour and social interaction.
- 4. Politics: Trust in politicians and political parties changes
- 5. Economic Indicators: Any significant changes





With the guidance and supervision of teachers Mrs Pampou and Mr Monoyios the whole team conducted their research in a thorough and professional manner. Research questions and hypothesis were defined and the team constructed a questionnaire that would help them gather the necessary data while they also conducted interviews.

After gathering data from a sample of 156 residents of Famagusta District, the students wrote their report including their findings and conclusions and presented them before a jury in Nicosia. The team was happy with the way the project went, as were their teachers – we are now awaiting the publication of the results.

International English Language Competition - 'Best In English'

This was an on-line event which attracted more than 8000 entrants from around the globe. Five of the top ten students in Cyprus were Xenion students and the First Place winner in Cyprus, as well as being 145th in the world – out of a field of so many thousands, was *Andreas Moustakas*, Year 6.



Duke of Edinburgh International Award (DoE)

The Duke of Edinburgh Award programme, which first started in 1956, is active in 114 countries for young people between the ages of 14 and 25. The DoE Award equips the youngsters with life skills to make a difference to themselves, their communities and the world. They experience adventure, acquire new skills and make new friends. The Award programme consists of 3 levels, Bronze, Silver and Gold.





In addition, *Florentia Koutsofta* got a Commendation in the 'Poetry Based on Folklore' category.




